1. ISCAR Membership Contribution for 2008

The ISCAR membership contribution for 2008 is \$25 USD. All persons who want to be members of ISCAR are asked to make this contribution. If this amount is problematic, then write to ISCAR's president, Seth Chaiklin <seth@iscar.org>

Preferred methods for making this contribution are by credit card, bank transfer or Paypal. It is not a problem if several persons want to send their contribution together in a single payment, simply inform: treasurer@iscar.org

2. Background Information Concerning Membership Contribution

When ISCAR started in 2002, the Executive Committee decided to make two possibilities for membership contribution (\$50 USD or \$25 USD). Furthermore, it was decided that all persons were full members of ISCAR, regardless of the amount they contributed. Recognizing variations both in individual life circumstances and interest to support ISCAR, the Executive Committee wanted each individual to decide the amount they wanted to contribute, rather than treat its members in categories (such as employment status or country of resi-

dence). The two values were chosen as being possible for all persons to pay, regardless of their individual situation, and allowed ISCAR to avoid classifying persons categorically.

Since 2002, it has been possible for ISCAR to develop some financial resources, as well as have sufficient funds for its minimal operating costs. Therefore the Executive Committee has decided to simplify matters even further and use only a single amount for the membership contribution.

Reflections on ISCAR's Financial Policy

Dear ISCAR Member,

In my last communication [ISCAR News, Vol. 5, No. 1], I explained the heterogeneous nature of the scientific interests that come together within ISCAR, and some of its implications for ISCAR's organisational form. In this communication, I discuss ISCAR's financial policy and its implications for ISCAR's activities.

So far ISCAR's operating costs have been minimal. The webserver and its content has been produced and run on a voluntary basis. The same for the newsletter. We will continue to try to use minimal resources, but it is likely that in the near future we will need to use some of our financial resources to insure the stability and quality of the website and the newsletter. The budget for the Congress is supported entirely by participant fees. ISCAR funds have been used, if necessary, as a loan to help Congress organisers with initial expenses. Executive Committee meetings have been financed by individual members of the Executive Committee. I hope this will continue to be possible in the future. In short, ISCAR has not had an extensive (or expensive) central bureaucracy — not even a part-time secretary for that matter! Its Executive Committee has not been enjoying luxury hotels and firstclass travel. As President, I paid the costs of my participation in Sevilla, and will have to make applications to get the resources to come to San Diego.

The main function of ISCAR is to support scientific communication (as seen in the Society's Articles 3 and 4). Such activities could, in principle, be initiated and managed centrally in ISCAR. One is familiar with other scientific organisations that have extensive publication activities, organise symposia, and so forth.

However, at its last meeting, the Executive Committee decided not to use ISCAR's financial resources to support, for example, travel to its international Congress, projects to publish relevant manuscripts, operating costs for regional and local meetings. Rather the Executive Committee chose a minimalist form, where activities within ISCAR should be initiated and supported by its members, not as 'official' ISCAR activities, but as activities initiated by ISCAR members.

I believe the main reasons for this policy choice were (a) the diversity within ISCAR, in combination with limited resources, which makes it difficult to choose particular projects to support, and (b) an interest to maintain a minimal membership contribution so that everyone who wants to participate in the scientific communication found within ISCAR will have the possibility to do so. The recent decision to set a minimal annual ISCAR contribution for 2008 can be understood in relation to this policy.

Clearly there is an interaction between having financial resources and initiating/supporting scientific activities. Many ISCAR members can (and would be willing to) give a larger annual contribution. However, the minimalist financial policy can be understood in relation to the idea that ISCAR's diversity should be served by member-initiated activities, rather than centrally-organised projects — as explained in my previous communication.

ISCAR's 'wealth' lies among its members and their efforts and abilities to organise useful activities. In this spirit, ISCAR tries to encourage the development of local and regional activities that support scientific communication, with the ISCAR organisation providing some practical support in terms of its website and mailing lists. Where possible, ISCAR can also provide letters of support and/or other forms of coordination that might make it easier for individuals and groups to seek financial or practical support in relation to ISCAR activities.

Beginning on January 2, 2008, all of our edito-

Most readers should be familiar with submitting and reviewing manuscripts online, because other journals have been using online submission for some time. Psychotherapy in everyday life

Description

Shows how clients employ therapy in their daily lives. The varied and extensive efforts involved in this are systematically overlooked in therapy research. The book shines important new light on processes of personal change and learning in practice. More generally speaking, it launches a theory of personhood based on how persons conduct their everyday lives in social practice. This approach and many of the book's findings are of immediate relevance for understanding other fields of expert practice.
