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### **On ISCAR's Executive Committee**

#### Dear ISCAR Member,

This letter is the third in my series of communications to ISCAR members. The first letter discussed 'what is ISCAR', explaining the diversity of the theoretical and substantive interests found among its members. The second letter discussed ISCAR's financial policy, focusing on its minimal membership fee and the importance of an active membership for organising activities (with ISCAR providing support with its website, mailing-list server, knowledge and experience. In this letter, I explain about ISCAR's Executive Committee. This letter is particularly relevant for all members because a new Executive Committee will be elected in September at the ISCAR Congress in San Diego.

The formal definition of the Executive Committee and its functions are found in ISCAR's Articles 18-32. Some of the formulations are in a (hard-to-comprehend) language required in legal documents. However, even if one looks past that language, it is still difficult to see that ISCAR's Executive Committee has a role not normally found within other scientific organisations. Therefore, this letter will focus on explaining about the Committee's structure and main functions, and conclude with a comment about the future.

#### Committee Structure

The composition and election of the Executive Committee are defined in ISCAR Articles 20 and 21, with their associated Standing Orders. All ISCAR members are eligible to be in the Executive Committee, which can have from 9-12 members. At present there are 11 members in the Committee. The Committee is always elected at the ISCAR Congress by the ISCAR members. Before the Congress, the existing Executive Committee creates a set of regions, based on the current membership, aiming to follow the principle in ISCAR's Article 20 to be 'as representative of the members of nations and regions as possible.' At the Congress, members are called to meet in their respective regional groups, for the purpose of electing a member of the Executive Committee. A newly-elected Executive Committee elects a President, a Vice-President, a Treasurer, and a Secretary, as explained in Article 22. A coming newsletter will explain this process in more detail, including information about the regional composition, and I will prepare a letter about that election.

#### Committee Functions

The Executive Committee is the main 'working' body in the ISCAR organisation. It has two main functions: one administrative; the other organisational.

Perhaps some believe that the Executive Committee is where important political and intellectual decisions are taken. In general, there are not important political issues to decide within the Executive Committee. Perhaps the most important political decision was taken in Moscow in 2006, when it was decided not to use ISCAR funds to support member activities, but rather to encourage and support local and regional initiatives - though this 'decision' was mostly a formalisation of the already existing tradition and practice within the Executive Committee. Most decisions in the Executive Committee have been within the administrative sphere. I will first discuss the administrative functions in more detail, followed by a discussion of the organisational functions.

#### Administrative Functions

The Executive Committee is the body within ISCAR responsible for administering the Society's business. When ISCAR was formed in 2002, it overtook the ISCRAT webserver, website, database, and a draft set of Articles, as well as the database for the 2000 SSCS conference. but there were no established administrative procedures. Much of the work over the past 6 years has been to build up the internal organisation of ISCAR (e.g., the Articles and Standing Orders, the website, a newsletter, a logo, a presentation, membership database, a bank account, methods of payment, discounts on book purchases and journal subscriptions, the idea of 'sections', and so forth), and to elaborate procedures to manage these things. To date, no persons have been hired to work for ISCAR. All the Society's administrative work has been achieved voluntarily by the Executive Committee (with the exception of the work of Christoph Clases and Jonna Kangasoja, who each produced one newsletter, and Gilberto Pérez and Jan Derry who helped to proof-read for a couple of years). In the future, it may be desirable for the administration of membership registration and payment to be handled by a person hired for that purpose.

Consistent with the minimalist model of a central organisation (as discussed in my first letter), the main administrative tasks of ISCAR are to: (a) maintain the membership database, (b) collect membership contributions, (c) formulate and administer policies for using its funds, (d) seek member benefits, (e) provide communication resources (e.g., website, member-initiated mailing lists), (f) provide information through the website, newsletter, and occasional email announcements, (g) answer diverse questions from members and others, and (h) identify the organisers of the international Congress.

The Executive Committee is now in the process of approving a series of written documents that formulate the administrative tasks within ISCAR more explicitly. This process is, in effect, formalising what has existed as informal practices, or finding a consensus about future practices of the committee. Also, in this connection, Vitali Rubtsov and Anne-Nelly Perret-Clermont from the Executive Committee are working with a team of ISCAR members (Inna Korepanova, Arkaday Margolis, Elvis Mazzoni, and Felice Carugati) to further develop the ISCAR website.

Except for the newsletter and website, most of these administrative functions, while essential, are probably not particularly noticeable to the membership. More significant is the other main function of the Executive Committee the organisational.

#### Organisational Functions

At the first meeting of the first ISCAR Executive Committee, a round was taken among Committee members to hear their views about the main function of the Committee. It can be seen that from the very beginning, the Executive Committee viewed its function as providing information and coordination. 'The committee was seen to be an organ for dissemination of information about regional seminars and workshops, supporting the arrangement of those, involving new persons to the cooperation, developing the identity and profile of the Society as well as disseminating knowledge of it and its activities. Rather than being a scientific decision maker the committee was seen as an organizer and catalyst" (Minutes from Executive

Committee meeting, 22 June 2002, http: //www.iscar.org/minutes2.html).

The most important work of each member of the Executive Committee is to help organise activities within the region for which this person is elected. The particular activities might include annual meetings, mailing lists, symposia, doctoral courses, cooperation with other regions, webpages, and so forth. All these activities together are too much for one person, but the Executive Committee member should be helping to raise and initiate ideas as well as interact with and support initiatives from members in the region.

#### The Future

In September 2008, at the ISCAR Congress, the members in attendance must elect a member to the new Executive Committee. This will be an exciting and important moment in ISCAR's further development. Many persons who have been in ISCAR's Executive Committee since its beginning, including the current president, must now leave the Committee. After the Congress in San Diego, ISCAR will necessarily have a new president (who will be selected by the newlyelected Executive Committee), and the new Committee will have no member who was present in ISCAR's first Executive Committee. Maybe this transition crises will vield some momentary (though, at present, there are no concrete reasons to expect any). If they do arise, I believe that over time we will come to appreciate these moments as part of the necessary growth of ISCAR as a scientific society.

#### Conclusion

ISCAR is an association of scientific colleagues. The Executive Committee is not a political body that represents the interests of its members, but an administrative body that manages a few central functions within ISCAR and an organisational body that tries to initiate and support member initiatives. In that respect, if one wants to see more activities within ISCAR, then you must consider who you have elected to the Executive Committee, and the extent to which you have brought ideas and voluntary labour to initiate or support desired activities.

### 3. 18th Activity Theory Conference, Rosnæs, Denmark, 16 – 18 November, 2007

The 18th conference on activity theory was held from 16–18 November in Rosnæs, Denmark, with about 45 participants — a mixture of university-based researchers, doctoral students, and persons working in public institutions, and coming from several different professions and disciplines including psychology, occupational therapy, computer systems, nursing, sociology, criminology, and pedagogy.

The theme of the conference was *Ac*tion- and practice-research: Differences and change. As noted before in this newsletter, the name of the conference has been retained from its historical origin, but today, the participants come from a variety of different theoretical traditions that could be described primarily as cultural-historical, activity-theoretical, and critical psychology. 1932-1937. There are also plans to have a session on the zone of proximal development.

On the first evening, the participants were placed in groups to discuss what they liked about this meeting. Many experience the meeting as comparable to an annual family get-together; and an important opportunity to have good dialogues with others with shared theoretical perspectives.

The main theme of the meeting was addressed by a series of researchers who are engaged in forms of research in and on practice. Each researcher presented their work, followed by reactions from a discussant and then a general discussion. There were many good theoretical discussions and debates about the methodological problems involved in research on practice, with a particularly active debate about the concept of 'coresearcher' (i.e., the relation of the persons who are the object of research to the researcher).

## **Publications**

### 6. Complete Collected Works of Lev Semenovich Vygotsky to be Published

The Lev Vygotsky Fund is preparing to publish the complete collected works of Lev Semenovich Vygotsky. The collected works will include new materials from the L.S. Vygotsky family archives and from other private and state archives. Also, they will contain the original versions of all previously published materials written by L.S. Vygotsky. The collected works will be annotated by leading Vygotsky scholars.

While in the early 1980s a Moscow publishing company, Pedagogics, published the collected works of Vygotsky in six volumes, the volumes were incomplete. Some of the published papers had essential gaps, and many important papers and other materials were not included.

The new complete collected works will include not only Vygotsky's most famous books and articles, but also will make widely available for the first time his early articles, manuscripts, scientific diaries, notes, and letters. The collected works will be grouped chronologically to allow readers to re-create a fuller picture of L.S. Vygotsky's scientific creativity and to track the evolution of his theoretical ideas. Also, they will include informal and documentary photographs directly related to Vygotsky and his life.

## **ISCAR News**

### 7. Georg Rückriem receives ISCAR Service Medal

The Executive Committee has initiated the ISCAR Service Medal to acknowledge significant contribution to promoting or sustaining the research community engaged in multidisciplinary theoretical and empirical research on societal, cultural and historical dimensions of human practices (which is ISCAR's purpose). The first recipient of this Medal is Georg Rückriem. Some of Professor Rückriem's major contributions include: initiator and organiser of the first ISCRAT Congress in Berlin in 1986; initiator and organiser of the first Executive Committee of ISCRAT (see photo below from around 1988); initiated, co-edited,

and produced eight double issues of the Multidisciplinary Newsletter for Activity Theory from 1988 to 1994; initiated the website 'International Cultural-Historical Human Sciences' (and developed further with Joachim Lompscher and now Hartmut Giest); and recently completed editing translations of A.N. Leontiev's works into German. Along with the Medal, ISCAR will pay the cost of a plane ticket to the Second ISCAR Congress, together with the congress fee and the housing cost as a small acknowledgement of his voluntary contributions over the years.
